## JOHN COLTRANE

(1926 - 1967)

John William Coltrane, also known as "Trane," was an innovative jazz saxophonist who left an immense legacy to the jazz community. His influence on jazz, both mainstream and avant-garde, was so significant that it continues to grow to this day. He remains one of the most revered saxophonists in the history of jazz. Early in his career he played alto, later switched to tenor, and on his seventh album, MY FAVORITE THINGS, was featured playing the soprano saxophone.

One of the most distinctive aspects of Coltrane's music was the way he used chord progressions. Normally, standard "changes" move in fourths and fifths. His approach was entirely different as he instead used a series of key center movements by thirds. These third-related progressions provided Coltrane with a basis for continued experimentation with both melody and harmony. A good example of third-related progressions is found in GIANT STEPS. This sound was so identifiable that it eventually had its own name—Coltrane's Changes.

The tunes in this volume span traditional standards, such as BODY AND SOUL, BYE BYE BLACKBIRD and ALL OR NOTHING AT ALL, to Coltrane's own compositions, like the hauntingly beautiful ballad NAIMA, to the straight ahead, up tempo GIANT STEPS and IMPRESSIONS. Transposed for Eb instruments from the original John Coltrane Omnibook in Bb, some of the lower notes may be out of range. If a note, phrase or page is played up an octave, it may provide a solution, as well as broadening the player's musicality.
